A Toast To King Jesus

Dear **Yeshua**,

Thursday, 19 November 2020, 9AM.

For a long time now I have wanted to speak forth a Toast to King Jesus in the presence of witnesses.

It seems that the Lord Holy Spirit has now made the time available.

Here therefore is our Toast to King Jesus.

—A TOAST TO KING JESUS—

Hear Ye, Hear Ye, Hear Ye.

Please join us in honoring in these Last Days of The Acceptable Year, Jesus of Nazareth, known to the first Christians as Yeshua Ha'Mashiach — Jesus our Messiah.

According to Scripture, in the Book of Isaiah, chapter 9 verse 6, Jesus is declared to be a Child and a Son, Whose Name is:

WONDERFUL,
COUNSELOR,
MIGHTY GOD,
EVERLASTING FATHER,
PRINCE OF PEACE.

It is further declared in the Book of Isaiah, chapter 9, verse 7, that:

Of the increase of His government and peace
There will be no end,
Upon the throne of David and over His kingdom,
To order it and establish it with judgment and justice
From that time forward, even forever.
The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this.

Jesus is revealed in the Book of Revelation, chapter 19, verse 16, to have a Name written:

KING OF KINGS
AND
LORD OF LORDS.

Therefore, we do hereby agree with The Word of God, and humbly ask the Almighty and Omnipotent Father God to Bless His Son Jesus, and give unto Him all of His Heart's desire.

Therefore, we drink this toast to the Good Health of the Body of Christ, and to the Head of the Church, to You Lord Yeshua, we drink this Cup of Adoration, and wait for the Day when we will all join King Jesus as He drinks of the fruit of the vine once again with His People, just as He said He would.

P. S. I was at the home of (CB59) on the morning of Saturday, 21 November 2020, where we were together and presented this Toast to the King Jesus in His presence. The night before, the Lord prompted me to look at a certain Scripture, in 1st Chronicles, and send it via email to (CB59). Here is the text of the Word which was sent:

The Book of First Chronicles
Chapter 19
Verses 1 Through 19

It happened after this that Nahash the king of the people of Ammon died, and his son reigned in his place.

Then David said,

*"I will show kindness to Hanun the son of Nahash,
because his father showed kindness to me."*

So David sent messengers to comfort him concerning his father. And David's servants came to Hanun in the land of the people of Ammon to comfort him.

And **the princes** of the people of Ammon said to Hanun,

*"Do you think that David really honors your father
because he has sent comforters to you?
Did his servants not come to you to search
and to overthrow and to spy out the land?"*

Therefore Hanun took David's servants, shaved them, and cut off their garments in the middle, at their buttocks, and sent them away.

Then some went and told David about the men; and he sent to meet them, because the men were greatly ashamed.

And the king said,

"Wait at Jericho until your beards have grown, and then return."

When the people of Ammon saw that they had made themselves repulsive to David, Hanun and the people of Ammon sent a thousand talents of silver to hire for themselves chariots and horsemen from Mesopotamia, from Syrian Maacah, and from Zobah.

So they hired for themselves thirty-two thousand chariots, with the king of Maacah and his people, who came and encamped before Medeba. Also the people of Ammon gathered together from their cities, and came to battle.

Now when David heard of it, he sent Joab and all the army of the mighty men. Then the people of Ammon came out and put themselves in battle array before the gate of the city, and the kings who had come were by themselves in the field.

When Joab saw that the battle line was against him before and behind, he chose some of Israel's best and put them in battle array against the Syrians. And the rest of the people he put under the command of Abishai his brother, and they set themselves in battle array against the people of Ammon.

Then he said,

*"If the Syrians are too strong for me, then you shall help me;
but if the people of Ammon are too strong for you,
then I will help you. Be of good courage,
and let us be strong for our people and for the cities of our God.
And may the Lord do what is good in His sight."*

So Joab and the people who were with him drew near for the battle against the Syrians, and they fled before him.

When the people of Ammon saw that the Syrians were fleeing, they also fled before Abishai his brother, and entered the city.

So Joab went to Jerusalem.

Now when the Syrians saw that they had been defeated by Israel, they sent messengers and brought the Syrians who were beyond the River, and Shophach the commander of Hadadezer's army went before them.

When it was told David, he gathered all Israel, crossed over the Jordan and came upon them, and set up in battle array against them. So when David had set up in battle array against the Syrians, they fought with him.

Then the Syrians fled before Israel; and David killed **seven thousand charioteers** and forty thousand foot soldiers of the Syrians, and killed Shophach the commander of the army. And when the servants of Hadadezer saw that they were defeated by Israel, they made peace with David and became his servants.

So the Syrians were not willing to help the people of Ammon anymore.
